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Rector's Thoughts...

Last Things First!



Advent Sunday commences a new Church Year. The word *advent* comes from the Latin *adventus*...meaning *coming*. Advent is the season of preparation for the First Coming of Jesus on Christmas Day...and anticipates his Second Coming at the end of time. It is this anticipatory nature of the Season of

Advent that compels us to meditate on **LAST THINGS FIRST**...Death, Judgment, Heaven and Hell.

The LAST THINGS FIRST theme is most evident in the Collect for Advent Sunday (*Book of Common Prayer, Page 90*). Put into modern English...

GOD HELP US TO STOP BEHAVING BADLY...KEEP US FROM DOING THINGS WE TRY TO HIDE FROM YOU...HELP US INSTEAD TO DO THINGS WE WANT PEOPLE TO SEE...THINGS JESUS TEACHES SO WHEN HE COMES BACK TO JUDGE THOSE ALIVE...AND THOSE WHO HAVE DIED...WE MAY BE READY AND ABLE TO SEE YOU IN HEAVEN. (***)

The Rubric (italicized instructions) following the Collect directs us to...*SAY THIS COLLECT EVERY DAY UNTIL CHRISTMAS*...leaving no doubt in our minds we are to take the Collect seriously...**It's TIME TO GET OUR LIVES IN ORDER**...now...not later!

Most of us would rather not think about Last Things First. Getting ready for Christmas seems like a better idea. However...we can be certain we shall all face death...we shall all face judgment...heaven is something we hope for and have yet to experience...hell is the alternative to heaven.

The Season of Advent is ultimately about getting ready...preparing our hearts, minds and souls...to welcome the Jesus of the Manger on Christmas Day...the same Jesus of the Palm Sunday story of the Advent Sunday Gospel...who set the stage for what was to follow...and at his departure at the Ascension...promised he would return.


How do we get ready for his return...do what Saint Paul tells us to do in the Advent Sunday Epistle...get rid of dark and destructive behavior...embrace the Light that is Jesus.

Winter Ember Days...



The Wednesday, Friday and Saturday after 13 December (Saint Lucy's Day) are the Winter Ember Days. Ember Days are four separate sets of three days in the same week, which occur roughly at the beginning of the Four Seasons.

Ember Days were introduced into the

Church as special days of fasting, abstinence and prayer...to thank God for his gifts of nature, to teach us to use them in moderation and to reach out and help the needy. The word "ember" comes from the Latin "quattuor anni tempora" (the "four seasons of the year").

Prior to the reforms made by the introduction of the Gregorian calendar in the 16th Century...13 December was the Winter Solstice and longest night of the year. Saint Lucy's Day (the proper name Lucy comes from the Latin *lucia*...the feminine form of *lux*...meaning *light*) and signals the approach of Christmas and Christ...the Light of the World.

Gradually...the Ember Days lost their association with agriculture and today they are special days of prayer and fasting for the increase in vocations to the priesthood. Ordinations sometimes take place on the Ember Days. There is a great need for dedicated and pastoral clergy. In the Collect for the Ember Days, we ask Almighty God to "put it into the hearts of many men to offer themselves for this ministry." (*Book of Common Prayer, Page 260*)

BOOK REVIEW

What would the world have looked like if Adam and Eve had not given in to the serpent's temptation? *Perelandra* is C.S. Lewis' meditation on that question. It is the middle book in his "Space Trilogy." (The others are *Out of the Silent Planet* and *That Hideous Strength.*) It could be called a theological adventure novel. It features Ransom, who spends the school year teaching at a university

and the summers being kidnapped to other planets. On those other planets, he encounters old enemies, new friends, strange beasts, and other tests of his physical, and more importantly his moral strength and courage. It is not a "spoiler" to say that the end of the book is Lewis' beautiful description of what the world might have looked like without Original Sin, and therefore what the world will look like when it is fully redeemed.

THE TWELFTH NIGHT...



The Epiphany, or the Manifestation Christ to the Gentiles (Book of Common Prayer, Page 107) celebrates the "striking appearance" of Jesus to the Gentile, or non-Jewish world, represented by the Wise Men being led to Bethlehem by the star. The Eve of the Epiphany is called the "Twelfth Night".

Within Western Christianity...Epiphany concludes the liturgical Season of Christmas. Epiphany is also called Little Christmas, Theophany and Three Kings Day. There are many customs associated with Epiphany and in some countries it is a national holiday.
